Dear chevre,

Back in late October, I was talking with a colleague. I asked how their congregation was doing. They said, "I've been telling my people to vote early, to stay away from the polls on Election Day." I assumed their concern was coronavirus safety. No, they quietly corrected me. It wasn't only that. They didn't want their Black congregants to be targets of racially motivated anger as they voted, on a day when emotions were running high.

That pulled me up short. That's a fear I've never personally experienced.

2020 was a year of reckoning for America on race. For myself, I've been brought face-to-face with my own privilege as a white person, over and over, in personal encounters and while reading the news. I'm conscious that I've had affordable access to quality health care (including coronavirus testing) where my providers respond swiftly and appropriately to my needs. I am blessed to work in a stable job, here in our wonderful Temple community, which I can do remotely, protecting myself and my family during coronavirus. And I have never had to worry that the color of my skin would expose me or my family to harm, from unconscious or conscious bias, from civilians or police.

This year has thrown inequities in all those areas between white experience and Black and Brown experiences into extremely sharp relief.

Confronting my privilege has been uncomfortable—I've felt by turns embarrassed, guilty, defensive, and sad. But discomfort can open doors to needed change.

Our Jewish ethical treasury, Mishnah Pirkei Avot, exhorts, "hevei dan l'chol ha'adam l'chaf z'chut" (Pirkei Avot 1:6). Judge each person, regardless of race, by their good merits—give them the benefit of the doubt. We live in a country where that ideal of equal presumption of good merit is not yet fully realized by our institutions of criminal justice, healthcare, and education. There's a long way still to go. Our Social Justice and Antiracism Committees have begun creating opportunities for our congregation to educate ourselves about systemic racism, large and small, and to work together to change it.

As we look forward to celebrating our 33rd Martin Luther King Jr. Shabbat service with our friends and neighbors, Calvary Baptist Church, on January 15 at 7:00 pm (by Zoom and Facebook Live), I am grateful for the opportunity this service affords to listen to our Black neighbors—to hear their stories—and to create hope together for a brighter future. Rabbi Rachel and I are working closely with Calvary's Pastor Kenneth Young and Music Minister Joe Devoe to adapt our service for an online format with the wonderful choirs and musicians of our congregations, and we're excited for the participation of our Greater Haverhill interfaith community.

May we look back on this year as a year in which our country's collective discomfort turned tides of inequity and injustice, and helped inspire all to tikkun olam, the work of repair.

Dear chevraya,

Winter is finally here! It seems like we had a drawn-out fall. Probably because of COVID, I was struck by those warm-enough-to-comfortably-walk-outside days lasting longer than usual. But now we find ourselves wearing layers, drinking lots of tea, and staring out the window at bare trees. When I first moved to the East Coast many years ago, trees losing their leaves was very strange to me! I was so awestruck by this phenomenon that I gathered some of the brilliantly colored fallen leaves and mailed them to my sister in San Francisco.

Later this month we celebrate Tu biShvat, which literally means the fifteenth day of the month of Sh'vat, but is known as the New Year for the Trees—ראש השנה לאילנות. Originally, Tu biShvat was one of four new years referenced in the Mishnah and the Talmud. It coincided with the sap rising and the trees budding and marked the new year for purposes of calculating agricultural tithes. Over time, Tu biShvat evolved into a celebration of the land of Israel and our connection to it. In the State of Israel, Tu biShvat is observed with tree-planting ceremonies. Those of us outside the land have the opportunity to donate money to the Jewish National Fund so they may plant trees on our behalf. All of this tree planting has resulted in Israel being the only country in the world that has more trees now than it did fifty years ago. That is quite remarkable and worth celebrating in itself!


Thanks to the Kabbalists, Tu biShvat also has great spiritual significance beyond the borders of the land of Israel. They created the tradition of Tu biShvat seders where we drink four glasses of wine (or grape juice) and eat specific fruits and nuts associated with the land of Israel, such as figs, olives, and almonds. According to the Kabbalists, each of the three groupings of fruit are associated with one of the levels of creation. When we eat the fruits and nuts with the proper intention, we engage in tikkun olam, the repairing of the world. I take from this that our people's existential and spiritual health and our planet's agricultural well-being are all one. The rituals of Tu biShvat help us maintain an awareness of the interconnectedness of all living things.

Please join me on erev Tu biShvat, January 27, for an evening of looking at Jewish texts on climate change. Meanwhile, sending you all warm and healing wishes as we endure this winter of 2021 that we will surely never forget.

Spotlight on Rachel Hanson



This month we're spotlighting Rachel Hanson, a beloved member of the Religious School faculty whose two daughters, Abby and Grace, both currently attend the Religious School. Rachel has been involved with Temple Emanu-El for most of her life! Her family joined the

temple in the mid-1980s, and she started attending the Religious School in pre-kindergarten. She had her bat mitzvah and confirmation at the temple, and graduated from Hebrew high school. During high school, Rachel was a madrichah in Eunice Miller's classroom. Drawing inspiration from a fellow Hebrew high school student who graduated a few years earlier, Rachel participated in NIFTY's Semester in Israel program for high school students.

As an undergraduate at UMass Amherst, Rachel majored in Judaic studies. During college, she spent a semester in Prague at the only Jewish studies program available to

exchange students outside of Israel, and then spent a year studying Eastern European Jewish history at Brandeis University. She worked for a Jewish nonprofit and then pivoted to working in higher education. She now works for an educational tech start-up.

After living in various towns in the Boston area including Waltham, Malden, and Medford, Rachel and her husband, John, moved to Haverhill when Rachel was pregnant with Abby and joined the temple when Abby started in TAPT. Rachel, who is an amazing singer, sang for many years in the choir at Temple Shir Tikva in Winchester. When Cantor Vera asked Rachel to join our choir, Rachel agreed, and she has been a dedicated and core member of the temple's choir ever since. In 2017, the Religious School's high school teacher left mid-year, and Rachel jumped at the chance to teach in the program that had been so impactful for her. She's now in her fourth year teaching in the high school program and has also served as a board member for the last few years. Rachel reports that Temple Emanu-El feels like home. We are so honored and grateful to have her and her family as part of our community!

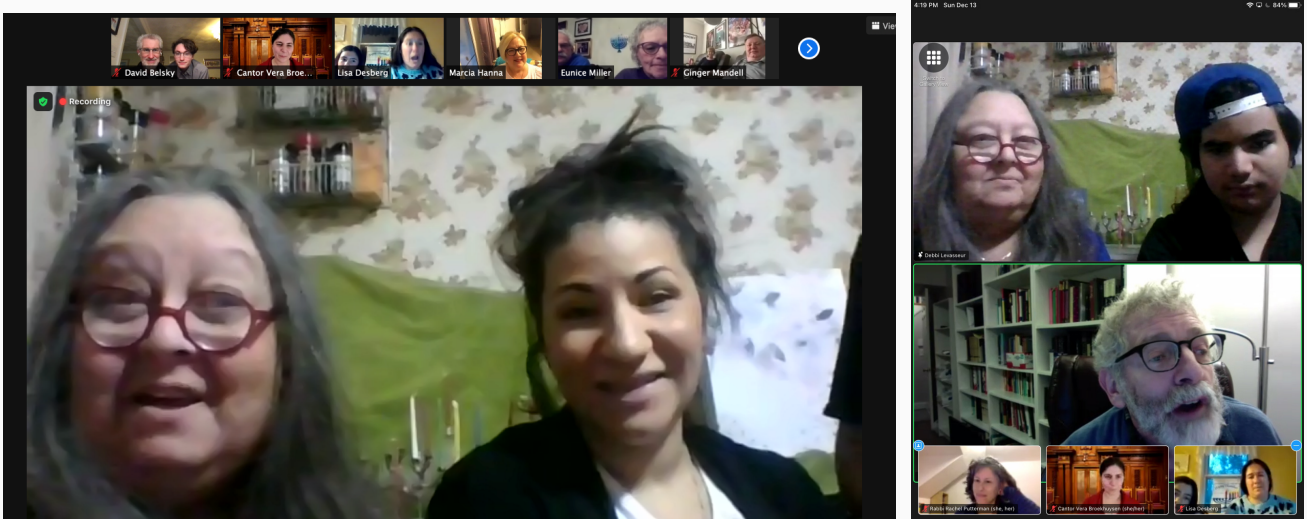
FAREWELL TO DEBBI LEVASSEUR

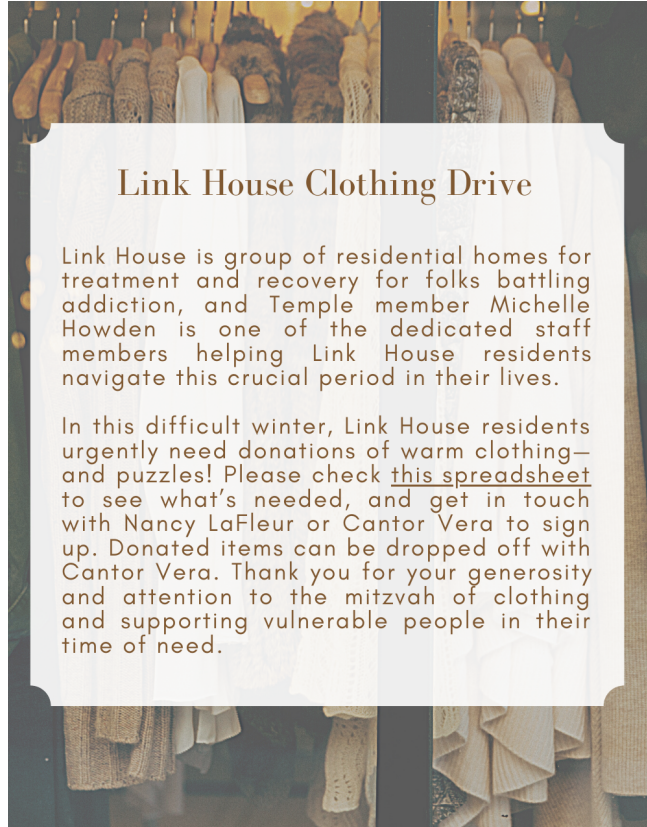

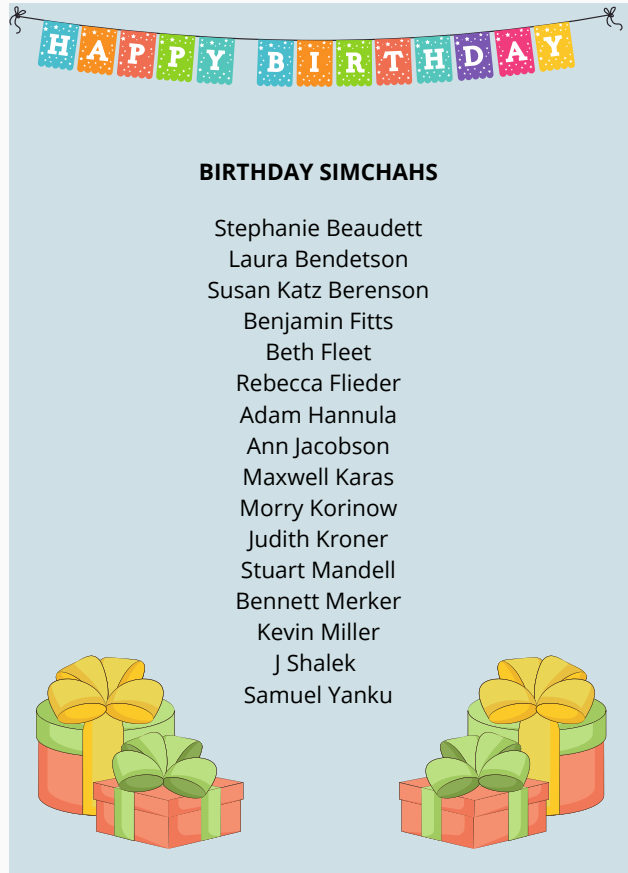
